

Introduction

Our people showed outstanding commitment in 2023, contributing tens of thousands of hours of their time to keep people safe and demonstrating why we are the first aid charity for Wales.

Their collective efforts helped us continue on our mission to save lives and enhance the health and wellbeing of communities in Wales, providing expert care, training, advice and support to people across the country.

Our people have continued to work tirelessly to deliver vital services to the public, while also strengthening links with our partners and making new relationships to ensure we can be of assistance to as many people as possible in the future.

We have continued our work to recruit new volunteers, from children aged 5 and above, helping to create future generations of lifesavers, while also working to support our existing volunteers and staff so they feel valued and they receive the recognition they deserve.

We continued our efforts to support communities across Wales, through successful schemes such as our Falls Response service and continuing to find new ways our people can help ease the pressure on our emergency services, including our Community Welfare Responders.

Staff and volunteers continued to find new ways to improve efficiency. This included the continued use of hybrid vehicles, replacement of older ambulances and installation of solar panels on some of our buildings.

There were also significant changes to our Board of Trustees in 2023. Gillian Knight, Rhys Jenkins and Professor Jean White CBE MStJ began their three-year terms as Trustees, while I began my tenure as Chair and Prior.

Many difficult decisions have been taken over the past year to put St John Ambulance Cymru on a path to securing financial sustainability and to ensure the charity is better prepared to deal with pressures of the post pandemic landscape.

We would like to thank those who have helped make these changes happen for their patience, understanding and hard work, without which this process would have been far more difficult, and to all of our supporters for helping us to continue our work across Wales.

Taking into account the challenges we face, we will continue to make the charity as resilient and efficient as possible so we can continue to help more people learn lifesaving skills and be there for the people of Wales, just in case.


Volunteers

The Order of St John

At our 2023 Investitures, long service medals or bars were given to **33** people for 10 years' service, **103** for 15-45 years' service, **3** for 50 years' service and **3** for between 55 and 60 years' service.

Training

In 2023, **8,175** people attended certified training, in courses like First Aid at Work and Emergency First Aid. We also held free to access demonstration sessions in lifesaving skills, for **13,923** people, who were part of community groups and schools.

Hear about our impact

"You take the first aid support for granted, but they really are so important."

Ian Cummins, who suffered a cardiac arrest while cycling as part of an endurance event in Pembrokeshire. A St John Ambulance Cymru volunteer paramedic team then quickly arrived on the scene to help with the CPR and defibrillation.

"If it was not for the team effort, knowledge, technology, training and professionalism of St John Ambulance Cymru, who knows where I would be now."

Our Volunteers

- Almost 60,000 volunteer hours were contributed at 1,425 events across Wales, helping to keep communities safe, in 2023.
- Our volunteers showed their commitment to developing their first aid skills, with 201 moving up a role training level, while 231 volunteers undertook their initial role training assessment in 2023.
- Volunteers accepted 94 activations from GoodSAM, the UK's cardiac arrest alerting system, with 112 of staff and volunteers signed up to receive alerts, more than 50% of them joining in 2023.
- Our volunteers helped treat 668
 patients at the Gerallt Davies Help
 Point in Swansea in 2023, supporting
 people and the nighttime economy.

Our volunteers gave up tens of thousands of hours of their time to make sure first aiders were on hand at more than 1,400 events up and down the country. This included small-scale celebrations such as community carnivals and Christmas festivities, as well as national occasions such as eisteddfods, music concerts, endurance events and international sporting fixtures.

Volunteers provided 10,000 hours of medical cover at the Principality Stadium helping hundreds of thousands of people to enjoy themselves safely at large-scale events.

Our people also ran a Help Point as part of the Builth Wells Events Safety Group, which won an award for supporting the safety of visitors at the Royal Welsh Show.

They were a very friendly team. They came to help at our show jumping event. It was one less worry to know they were there if needed (luckily we didn't need them) but it was great having their company for the day. A great team.

Stories from our communities: Eisteddfod First Aid Cover

49-year-old Dave High was providing first aid cover at the 2023 International Musical Eisteddfod in Llangollen with fellow volunteers, when a member of the public went into cardiac arrest.

He used the skills he had learnt with St John Ambulance Cymru to help save the gentleman's life using CPR and a defibrillator after he collapsed in the car park outside the event.

Alongside fellow St John Ambulance Cymru volunteers and an off-duty healthcare professional who was visiting the Eisteddfod. After several rounds of CPR and shocks from a defibrillator, the patient began breathing again.

Dave was awarded a Certificate of Commendation from the Order of St John in recognition of his contribution to the lifesaving efforts in this incident. You can find out more about how we acknowledge the amazing work our people do on page 18.

Dave said: "For a person that does not work in the medical field at all, it was the scariest but most satisfying thing I have ever done.

"Two years ago, I would never have thought I would even be going to the Eisteddfod, never mind saving a life while wearing a uniform that I am so proud to be able to wear.

"That night, when the worst happened, I didn't overthink, I didn't hesitate, there was no feeling of I hope I don't mess this up."

Defibrillators should not be feared, they can and do save lives. You should never be afraid to use it if the situation arises.



Stories from our communities: Responders in Powys

In the summer of 2023, Tom Frost and his partner Jax arrived at a remote area in Powys, where they go to relax. The couple weren't to know that shortly after arriving, Tom was going to need urgent medical care.

Tom and Jax were unloading the car when the pair noticed a wasps' nest. Tom felt a sharp sting in the centre of his forehead and instantly became very unwell.

"I could not think straight or even stand," he said. He slumped to the ground and with no phone signal, Jax ran to the nearest house to get help.

"I was very pale and thrashing around with a rash expanding from my head downwards", he recalls, as his body began to swell and develop hives. Jax called for the Emergency Services and before they knew it, St John Ambulance Cymru Responders arrived on scene.

St John Ambulance Cymru Responders are on-call volunteers who respond to local emergency incidents. They are highly trained individuals who often reach the scene and start treatment before the emergency services arrive.

The responders monitored Tom's observations in a calm way, administered antihistamine tablets and reassured them.

"I know Jax was extremely grateful for this," Tom said, "seeing your loved one so unwell in such a remote area was a real trauma, so to have these healthcare professionals within easy reach is something we are both eternally grateful for."

Jack Evans, one of the Responders who treated Tom, said: "St John Ambulance Cymru Responders in Powys are a crucial part of the community response, as seen with this incident. If Tom had

waited any longer for a response, then his reaction would have progressed and subsequently worsened.

"St John Ambulance Cymru responders are regular members of the community and volunteers who give up their time at the drop of a hat to respond to life threatening emergencies. I'm glad to hear Tom is doing well and staying away from wasps' nests!"

Tom, who has now fully recovered, commented: "It will always be an additional reassurance that medical help and expertise in the form of St John Ambulance Cymru are so close."

- We supported 1,918 patients as part of the Taith Dda Mental Health Response Service, which reduced average waiting times from 18 hours to 1 hour and 24 minutes.
- In 2023 we travelled 785,178 miles across Wales, treating patients in the community (8.65% increase on 2022).
- Our collaboration with the Vale of Glamorgan Council and Cardiff and Vale University Health Board Wellbeing Service is estimated to have saved the NHS £750,000 in a year.
- Our Falls Response Service in the Vale of Glamorgan was nominated for the Gofal Cymdeithasol Cymru / Social Care Wales 2024 Accolades awards.

Our Ambulance Operations went the extra mile in 2023, ensuring people got the care they needed as quickly as possible. We assisted the Welsh Ambulance Services NHS Trust (WAST) with urgent care ambulance support during the 2022/23 winter pressures and developed the Community Welfare Responder role to help save unnecessary emergency ambulance callouts. We also secured new contracts and contract extensions with local councils and health boards for our Falls Response Service.

We continue to be a vital supplier of non-emergency transport services, with contracts in the Cardiff and Vale, Aneurin Bevan and Swansea Bay University Health Board areas, supporting the movement of patients between hospitals and discharge to home. David was absolutely perfect. Not just his skill, knowledge and professionalism, but also his gentleness and compassion.

The way he spoke to my mum and handled her both when doing his investigations and when getting her up were exemplary; just the right blend of calm authority and old-fashioned good manners. We are very grateful to him and St John Ambulance Cymru, as your existence means she was off the floor and able to eat, drink and go to the toilet, hours before the ambulance arrived.

- 8,175 people were equipped with new skills having attended a course run by our Workplace Training Team.
- 13,923 people were trained for free by our volunteers and community trainers in schools, clubs and groups across Wales
- National campaigns such as
 Defibruary and Save a Life
 September helped raise awareness of essential lifesaving skills such as CPR to almost 6,000 members of the public.

Our Workplace Training Team helped thousands more people gain essential first aid skills and certified qualifications at a variety of sites across Wales, including our 8 dedicated training venues or at their business premises.

More than **8,000** people attended courses we offer, from First Aid at Work to Mental Health First Aid. We also introduced new courses in 2023 such as Farmers First Aid and Outdoor First Aid, responding to requests from specific industries.

Our Community Trainers and volunteers helped spread first aid skills for free, with almost **14,000** people at schools, clubs and groups all across Wales now in possession of knowledge that could help them save a life should an emergency happen near them.

St John Ambulance Cymru delivered were well structured and pitched correctly for the children in each class. It was very informative and the children learnt what to do in an emergency situation.

Our Children and Young People programmes continued to inspire those aged 5 and above in 2023, helping them learn essential first aid skills and teach a range of other valuable lessons for life, with support from our dedicated volunteer leaders.

2023 also saw the launch of new subjects to help inspire our Children and Young People to continue their St John Ambulance Cymru journey. A Space Badger subject was launched on our Super Badger programme, a Cadet First Aider was created for those aged 11-15, while a Public Health Wales Grand Prior Subject was also introduced.

By the end of 2023 we had over 300 Badgers and 850 Cadets learning first aid and other invaluable life skills across 30+ Badger Setts and 80+ Cadet Divisions pan Wales.

Stories from our communities: Mike Williams from Port Talbot

When Mike Williams from Port Talbot attended a First Aid at Work refresher course with St John Ambulance Cymru Workplace Trainer Gareth Parsons, he didn't know that the skills he learnt there would help him save someone's life just two months later.

Mike, who now lives in Caerphilly, was on duty as a Security Officer in Cardiff when he had a phone call about a medical emergency nearby. Along with some of his colleagues, Mike quickly grabbed the defibrillator at reception and made his way to the scene. On arrival, Mike and his colleagues discovered a male lying face down on the floor.

They rolled the patient onto his back and did the primary survey. They quickly discovered that the patient was unresponsive, correctly assessing he had gone into cardiac arrest. Mike and his colleagues started CPR immediately and promptly connected the patient to a defibrillator.

"After numerous rounds of chest compressions and at least three shocks from the defibrillator, he began to start breathing again." Mike recalls.

Shortly after the patient had been resuscitated, paramedics arrived at the scene and took over. The patient was rushed to hospital and received surgery on his heart.

Mike said: "I would like to thank St John Ambulance Cymru and Gareth Parsons for the training I received, which enabled me to help to successfully save the life of someone who suffered a cardiac arrest."

"First aid and defibrillator training is so important; the more confident people are to help others, the better."

It's reported that a patient's survival chances are reduced by 10% for every passing minute without action following a cardiac arrest. The quicker you act, the more chance you have to save a life.



Stories from our communities: Bethan Wyn Jones

St John Ambulance Cymru Cadet Bethan Wyn Jones has been a loyal member of the Deeside Division since she was just 7.

Bethan joined because she loved learning about first aid and wanted to find out even more.

She loves each week's session, learning new things and making new friendships.

I love the feeling of being part of a wider family at St John Ambulance Cymru.

It's taught her a lot about healthcare and Bethan is keen to pursue a career in the sector in her adult life.

Bethan has already used her first aid skills in real life situations.

On one occasion when a friend was hit by a car outside his school, she had the confidence to manage the situation, assessing him and helping him up (once deciding it was safe for him to do so) and advising him to visit hospital so he could be checked over.

She said her training had taught her essential patient care skills:



aid skills all over Wales.



Charitable activities: 91.4%


Raising funds: 8.4%
